2	3 Say the days of the week. Say each day and jump for each syllable (e.g., Saturday=3)	4	5 Clap the syllables of 10 things that you see on a walk outdoors. Include words in your home language.	6 Tap out the syllables of the items that you are packing into your child's backpack (e.g., paper, book).	7 PA DAY	8 Read a book together. Find 5 words that have 3 syllables. Say the words slowly so you can hear all the syllables.
9 Name five animals. Hop for each syllable. Include words in your home language.	10	11 Read a book together. Pick five 'longer' words and say how many syllables there are in each word.	12 Clap the syllables in 5 of your favourite foods (e.g., pizza=2, banana=3, waffles=2).	13	14 Look at the grocery flyers. Take turns tapping out the number of syllables in a word (e.g., pear=1).	15
16 Transportation tap! Think of transportation items and 'tap' for each syllable in the word (e.g., taxi=2).	17	18 Clap out the syllables in each family member's name. Whose name has the most syllables?	19	20	21 First Day of Winter!	22 Use your footsteps to count syllables. How many syllables/steps in winter words like: snow (1), chilly (2), snowball (2).
23 Read a book. How many two syllable words can you find?		25 What is the next month? How many syllables in January?	26	27 Syllable snap! Snap your fingers for each syllable in the foods you eat.	28	29 One syllable words are the trickiest. Practice clapping 1 syllable words (e.g., man, girl, dad).
